We are pleased to invite you to the 2016 **Joint Meeting** of the EARLI Special Interest Groups **SIG 20** "Inquiry Learning" and **SIG 26** "Argumentation, Dialogue and Reasoning".

The conference will be held from Monday the 22th to Wednesday the 24th of August 2016 in Ghent, Belgium.

The conference will be hosted by Dr. Annelies Raes and Prof. Dr. Bram De Wever at the Department of Educational Studies, Faculty of Psychology and Educational Sciences, **Ghent University**.

By organizing the SIG meetings together we provide an opportunity to recognize how inquiry and argumentation constitute the pillars of education for thinking. Research has flourished in Inquiry Learning and in Argumentation for Learning. To a large extent, these domains have remained separate. First attempts to study their relations uncover a very rich field of research which is largely unexplored. It raises complex methodological and design issues while practically, students already combine inquiry and argumentation activities. This happens in classrooms in which progressive pedagogies are in place, e.g. in Mathematics and Science education. This combination is enabled and facilitated by technological tools, especially CSCL tools.

The meetings will take place in parallel which means there is a chance to visit each other's sessions and connect to both SIG 20 and SIG 26 members during coffee and lunch breaks. Moreover, the scientific committees of both SIGs will organize a joint session. Please find below per SIG the specific keynotes, the conference theme and topics, and the submission guidelines.

EARLI SIG 20 Inquiry Learning

Keynotes:

We are excited to present **Prof. Dr. Jim Slotta**, Department for curriculum, Teaching, and Learning and the Centre for Science, Mathematics, and Technology Education at OISE, University of Toronto and **Prof. Dr. Ard Lazonder**, Department of Instructional Technology, University of Twente as keynote speakers of the conference.

Conference theme and topics:

Inquiry practices include activities that scientists engage in to explore and explain different issues, topics, or problems in different knowledge domains. Natural scientists, for example, aim to explore, explain, and model world phenomena, while social scientists engage in inquiry to examine, interpret, and predict human behavior. Still, the main challenge for research on inquiry learning always seems to come down to the same question, regardless of its domain: How can we optimize the design and scaffolding of inquiry practices at different levels of education (preschool, primary, secondary, higher, and adult education)? On the one hand, earlier work has pointed out that it is equally important to think about how students reason with tools, support and environments, as it is crucial to assess what students exactly learn from inquiry practices. On the other hand, there is an increased attention towards experiences outside the classroom, next to traditional classroom activities, as part of a movement that tries to bridge formal with more informal learning. Therefore, the theme of "Inquiry in and outside classrooms" has been put forward for the SIG 2016 meeting.

Conference themes:

The EARLI Special Interest Group 26 on Argumentation, Dialogue, and Reasoning invites submissions for Papers, Symposia, or Posters to the SIG conference that will be held in Ghent, Belgium, on 22-24 August 2016. This is the first conference of the SIG. It will be an occasion to organize our community according to main themes. In the EARLI conference that took place in Limassol in August 2015, many events were directly related to our SIG. The themes that emerged from these events were:

- Learning to argue
- Argumentation in and across domains (Mathematics, History, etc.)
- Argumentation and epistemological beliefs
- Dialogue, reasoning and argumentation in multicultural contexts
- Scripts and scaffolds of argumentation
- Collective reasoning

- Inquiry and argumentation
- Argumentation and transfer

This community includes scientists in Education, Psychology, Computer Science, Computer Design, and Linguistics. We aim to continue constituting an interdisciplinary community of researchers.
